EAF - Part 3 Narrative Town of Gaines - Dollar General July 30, 2018

The Town of Gaines Zoning Board received a completed Full Environmental Assessment Form (Part 1) from the applicant for the Dollar General - Gaines. The overall project consists of the construction of an 9,100 square foot retail store.

The Town of Gaines Zoning Board has evaluated the proposed project using the criteria for determining significance identified in 6 NYCRR 617.4 and 617.5. Based upon an assessment of the magnitude and importance of potential impacts, no potential large environmental impacts have been identified and it is concluded that the proposed action will not have an adverse impact on the environment.

The following information is provided to document small potential impacts identified for the proposed action.

3-1 Impact on Land

The project involves the disturbance of approximately 1.37 acres of land. Land disturbance will involve the construction of the retail store, parking area and septic system. Additionally, the disturbance will consist of the creation of post-construction stormwater management facilities. Once the work is completed, the disturbed areas will be regraded, topsoil will be installed, the area will be re-seeded and vegetation will be restored.

No work will take place on areas identified with slopes of 15% or greater. All areas will have storm water protection measures installed prior to construction to minimize potential impacts due to the grading work. Post-Construction stormwater management facilities will be installed as part of the project to minimize impacts due to the disturbance.

3-3 Impacts on Surface Water

The project involves the disturbance of approximately 1.37 acres of land. Land disturbance will involve the construction of the retail store, parking area and septic system. Additionally, the disturbance will consist of the creation of post-construction stormwater management facilities. Once the work is completed, the disturbed areas will be regraded, topsoil will be installed, the area will be re-seeded and vegetation will be restored.

No work will take place on areas identified with slopes of 15% or greater. All areas will have storm water protection measures installed prior to construction to minimize potential impacts due to the grading work. Post-Construction stormwater management facilities will be installed as part of the project to minimize impacts due to the disturbance.

3-4 Impact on Groundwater

The retail store will make a connection to the public water system and generate waste that will be mitigated by the installation of a new septic system.

3-10 Impact on Historic and Archeological Resources

The project is located with an archaeological sensitive area. The proposed improvements are located directly across from a building listed as National Historic Landmark. The State Historic Preservation Office has been consulted and is reviewing the project. SHPO has requested that measures be taken

to preserve the landmark. Relocation of the proposed improvements has been requested for consideration. No final determination has been received.

3-15 Impact on Noise, Odor and Light

The project will not produce operating noise exceeding the local ambient noise level. Minor increases in noise may occur during the construction period; however, any impacts on ambient noise levels will be temporary in nature and will only occur during normal work hours, approximately 7:00 am - 5:00 pm Monday - Friday.

Light will be installed around the building however the plan will only impact the store property limits.

There are no anticipated impacts on odor as a result of the project.

SEQR Designation

On June 4, 2018 Part 1 of the EAF was sent to Involved/Interested Agencies along with the intent for the Town of Gaines Zoning Board to act as Lead Agency under the SEQR process.

- Orleans County Planning Department (Interested Agency)
- Orleans County Health Department (Interested Agency)
- New York State Department of Transportation (Interested Agency)
- State Historic Preservation Office (Interested Agency)
- Town of Gaines Town Board (Interested Agency)

A 30-day period was provided for comments on the Town's request to be Lead Agency for the project. No objections to the Town of Gaines Zoning Board acting as Lead Agency were received.

The State Historic Preservation Office requested additional information and will conclude their review no later than August 13, 2018. Correspondence was received from Kevin Bush, Regional Director Region 4 New York State Department of Transportation on June 14, 2018. No others correspondence was received regarding this matter.
